### ENGLISH

<p><b>English – Guided Reading and Reading Across the Curriculum</b></p>	<p><b>Reading – word reading</b>            continue to apply phonic knowledge and skills as the route to decode words until automatic decoding has become embedded and reading is fluent            read accurately by blending the sounds in words that contain the graphemes taught so far, especially recognising alternative sounds for graphemes            read accurately words of two or more syllables that contain the same graphemes as above            read words containing common suffixes            read further common exception words, noting unusual correspondences between spelling and sound and where these occur in the word            read most words quickly and accurately, without overt sounding and blending, when they have been frequently encountered            read aloud books closely matched to their improving phonic knowledge, sounding out unfamiliar words accurately, automatically and without undue hesitation            re-read these books to build up their fluency and confidence in word reading.</p> <p><b>Reading – comprehension</b>            develop pleasure in reading, motivation to read, vocabulary and understanding by:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● listening to, discussing and expressing views about a wide range of contemporary and classic poetry, stories and non-fiction at a level beyond that at which they can read independently</li> <li>● discussing the sequence of events in books and how items of information are related</li> <li>● becoming increasingly familiar with and retelling a wider range of stories, fairy stories and traditional tales</li> <li>● being introduced to non-fiction books that are structured in different ways</li> <li>● recognising simple recurring literary language in stories and poetry</li> <li>● discussing and clarifying the meanings of words, linking new meanings to known vocabulary</li> <li>● discussing their favourite words and phrases</li> <li>● continuing to build up a repertoire of poems learnt by heart, appreciating these and reciting some, with appropriate intonation to make the meaning clear</li> </ul> <p>understand both the books that they can already read accurately and fluently and those that they listen to by:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● drawing on what they already know or on background information and vocabulary provided by the teacher</li> <li>● checking that the text makes sense to them as they read and correcting inaccurate reading</li> <li>● making inferences on the basis of what is being said and done</li> <li>● answering and asking questions</li> <li>● predicting what might happen on the basis of what has been read so far</li> </ul> <p>participate in discussion about books, poems and other works that are read to them and those that they can read for themselves, taking turns and listening to what others say explain and discuss their understanding of books, poems and other material, both those that they listen to and those that they read for themselves.</p>
<p><b>English-Writing</b></p>	<p><b>Handwriting</b>            form lower-case letters of the correct size relative to one another            start using some of the diagonal and horizontal strokes needed to join letters and understand which letters, when adjacent to one another, are best left unjoined            write capital letters and digits of the correct size, orientation and relationship to one another and to lower case letters            use spacing between words that reflects the size of the letters.</p> <p><b>Writing – composition</b>            develop positive attitudes towards and stamina for writing by:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● writing narratives about personal experiences and those of others (real and fictional)</li> <li>● writing about real events</li> <li>● writing poetry</li> <li>● writing for different purposes</li> </ul> <p>consider what they are going to write before beginning by:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● planning or saying out loud what they are going to write about</li> <li>● writing down ideas and/or key words, including new vocabulary</li> <li>● encapsulating what they want to say, sentence by sentence</li> </ul>

	<p>make simple additions, revisions and corrections to their own writing by:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>evaluating their writing with the teacher and other pupils</li> <li>re-reading to check that their writing makes sense and that verbs to indicate time are used correctly and consistently, including verbs in the continuous form</li> <li>proof-reading to check for errors in spelling, grammar and punctuation [for example, ends of sentences punctuated correctly]</li> <li>read aloud what they have written with appropriate intonation to make the meaning clear.</li> </ul> <p><b>Writing – vocabulary, grammar and punctuation</b></p> <p>develop their understanding of the concepts set out in English Appendix 2 by:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>learning how to use both familiar and new punctuation correctly (see English Appendix 2), including full stops, capital letters, exclamation marks, question marks, commas for lists and apostrophes for contracted forms and the possessive (singular)</li> </ul> <p>learn how to use:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>sentences with different forms: statement, question, exclamation, command</li> <li>expanded noun phrases to describe and specify [for example, the blue butterfly]</li> <li>the present and past tenses correctly and consistently including the progressive form</li> <li>subordination (using when, if, that, or because) and co-ordination (using or, and, or but)</li> <li>the grammar for year 2 in English Appendix 2</li> <li>some features of written Standard English</li> </ul> <p>use and understand the grammatical terminology in English Appendix 2 in discussing their writing.</p>

<b>English - Read Write Inc</b>	<p><b>What is Read Write Inc?</b></p> <p>Read, Write, Inc Phonics is taught across R, 1 and 2 for all children learning to read. Children are grouped by their stage in phonics, rather than by their age. Children learn the 44 common sounds in the English language and how to blend them to read and spell. The scheme includes both a reading and a writing focus.</p> <p><b>Outline of RWI Phonics Teaching</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Initial sounds are taught in a specific order.</li> <li>Sounds taught should be ‘pure’ i.e. ‘b’, not ‘buh’ as this is central to phonic teaching and ability to recognise sounds in words.</li> <li>Blends are to be declustered. E.g. bl is two specific sounds.</li> <li>Children are to be taught that the number of graphemes in a word always corresponds to the number of phonemes. This greatly aids spelling.</li> <li>Set 2 sounds are to be taught after Set 1 (initial sounds).</li> <li>Letter names are to be introduced in Set 3.</li> </ul> <p><b>Objectives of RWI phonics</b></p> <p><b>Children will learn to...</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Apply the skill of blending phonemes in order to read words.</li> <li>Segment words into their constituent phonemes in order to spell words.</li> <li>Learn that blending and segmenting words are reversible processes.</li> <li>Read high frequency words that do not conform to regular phonic patterns.</li> <li>Read texts and words that are within their phonic capabilities.</li> </ul> <p>Use phonics knowledge to decode texts and spell effortlessly</p>

	<p><b>Number – number and place value</b>  count in steps of 2, 3, and 5 from 0, and in tens from any number, forward and backward  recognise the place value of each digit in a two-digit number (tens, ones)  identify, represent and estimate numbers using different representations, including the number line  compare and order numbers from 0 up to 100; use &lt;, &gt; and = signs  read and write numbers to at least 100 in numerals and in words  use place value and number facts to solve problems.  <b>Number – addition and subtraction</b>  solve problems with addition and subtraction:  <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● using concrete objects and pictorial representations, including those involving numbers, quantities and measures</li> <li>● applying their increasing knowledge of mental and written method</li> </ul> recall and use addition and subtraction facts to 20 fluently, and derive and use related facts up to 100  add and subtract numbers using concrete objects, pictorial representations, and mentally, including:  <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● a two-digit number and ones</li> <li>● a two-digit number and tens</li> <li>● two two-digit numbers</li> <li>● adding three one-digit numbers</li> </ul> show that addition of two numbers can be done in any order (commutative) and subtraction of one number from another cannot  recognise and use the inverse relationship between addition and subtraction and use this to check calculations and solve missing number problems  <b>Number – multiplication and division</b>  recall and use multiplication and division facts for the 2, 5 and 10 multiplication tables, including recognising odd and even numbers  calculate mathematical statements for multiplication and division within the multiplication tables and write them using the multiplication (x), division (÷) and equals (=) signs</p>		

show that multiplication of two numbers can be done in any order (commutative) and division of one number by another cannot  
solve problems involving multiplication and division, using materials, arrays, repeated addition, mental methods, and multiplication and division facts, including problems in contexts.

**Number – fractions**

recognise, find, name and write fractions  $\frac{1}{2}$ ,  $\frac{1}{4}$ ,  $\frac{2}{4}$ , and  $\frac{3}{4}$  of a length, shape, set of objects or quantity

write simple fractions for example,  $\frac{1}{2}$  of 6 = 3 and recognise the equivalence of  $\frac{2}{4}$  and  $\frac{1}{2}$

**Measurement**

choose and use appropriate standard units to estimate and measure length/height in any direction (m/cm); mass (kg/g); temperature ( $^{\circ}$ C); capacity (litres/ml) to the nearest appropriate unit, using rulers, scales, thermometers and measuring vessels

compare and order lengths, mass, volume/capacity and record the results using >, < and =

recognise and use symbols for pounds (£) and pence (p); combine amounts to make a particular value

find different combinations of coins that equal the same amounts of money

solve simple problems in a practical context involving addition and subtraction of money of the same unit, including giving change

compare and sequence intervals of time

tell and write the time to five minutes, including quarter past/to the hour and draw the hands on a clock face to show these times

know the number of minutes in an hour and the number of hours in a day

**Geometry – properties of shapes**

identify and describe the properties of 2-D shapes, including the number of sides and line symmetry in a vertical line

identify and describe the properties of 3-D shapes, including the number of edges, vertices and faces

identify 2-D shapes on the surface of 3-D shapes, [for example, a circle on a cylinder and a triangle on a pyramid]

compare and sort common 2-D and 3-D shapes and everyday objects

**Geometry – position and direction**

order and arrange combinations of mathematical objects in patterns and sequences

use mathematical vocabulary to describe position, direction and movement, including movement in a straight line and distinguishing between rotation as a turn and in terms of right angles for quarter, half and three-quarter turns (clockwise and anticlockwise).

**Statistics**

interpret and construct simple pictograms, tally charts, block diagrams and simple tables

ask and answer simple questions by counting the number of objects in each category and sorting the categories by quantity

ask and answer questions about totalling and comparing categorical data
