Fractured Fairy Tales

What is a fractured fairy tale?

It is a story that uses fairy tales you know and changes the characters, setting, points of view, or plots. Ever heard of *The True Story of the Three Little Pigs* or *The Wolf Who Cried Boy*?

Read a sample fractured fairy tale

Write your own fractured fairy tale

This week you will be writing your own fractured fairy tale for Little Red Riding Hood.



First of all you need to decide what you are going to change about the story. It is important not to change so much or it won't be recognisable as Little Red Riding Hood.

For these reasons you will only be changing one part of the story, you can change:

- The beginning e.g. why Red Riding Hood is sent by her mother to visit her grandma
- The middle e.g. how the wolf tricks her, if he eats her, if he eats grandma
- The end e.g. who rescues her, what happens to the wolf,
- One of the main characters e.g. Red Riding Hood or the wolf

You must make sure your fractured fairy tale still meet the features of a fairytale, as listed below:

What Makes a Story a Fairy Tale?

- Fairy tales nearly always begin with the words Once upon a time or Long, long ago.
- They usually have a good character and an evil character.
- They might involve magic or enchantment.
- A woodland/forest or castle is usually mentioned.
- There is always a problem, that is eventually solved and the good characters live happily ever after.
