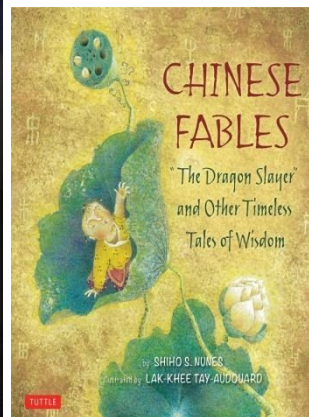
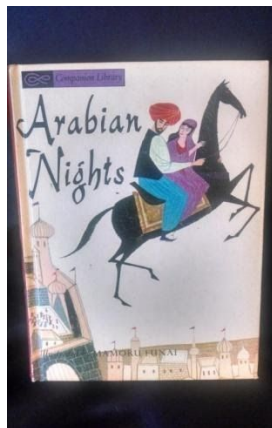
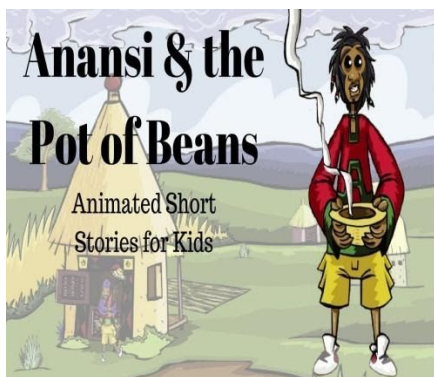
WALT identify fables

This week you are going to be entertained by lots of short stories.

Now, these stories are not any old stories. These are called **fables**.

A **fable** is a story, usually short but with a moral (life lesson) often found at the end. ...

Fable traditions are found in all parts of the world; there are many traditional fables which were born in India China, Africa and Arabia and these have travelled down through times. Here are pictures of some of these.



One man, known as Aesop, thought to be a slave storyteller from Ancient Greece, is famous for the many **fables** that he told during his life. These pictures are of Aesop.
